# Censorship or caring about our Children?

Many within our local community would be aware of my recent opposition to the screening of the film *Lolita*. On 8 March 1999, the Office of Film and Literature Classification classified the film R18+, effectively allowing the film to be screened for audiences for entertainment around the country.

The director worked to portray the paedophile sympathetically as someone audiences "could like, laugh at or feel for" even though he regularly sexually abuses his 14 year old step-daughter. Why would we as a society want mainstream acceptance of paedophile behaviour? My concern, and I believe many in our community are worried that there is perhaps a growing trend by some sections of the entertainment industry in producing films that exploit our young people and the theme of paedophilia purely for entertainment purposes and profit. Surely in this day and age, that is not a message we want to send to our young people.

# China/Australia Friendship Group visit China

Trish recently visited the People's Republic of China with her colleagues from the China/Australian Friendship Group. Trish was honoured to meet with several key Chinese officers in relation to opportunities for South Australia in China and vice versa. Among these people were Mr Liu Huaqui – Director, Central Foreign Affairs Office, Mr Yang Jiechi, Vice Minister, Ministry of Foreign Affairs and of course *Premier Zhu Rongji* stated that he greatly admired both our State, South Australia and Premier John Olsen. While in China, the friendship group had the opportunity to visit a Trade Exhibition which provides a superb market for SA business. Trish also visited the Australian Primary Health Care and Water Supply project in Tibet. South Australia has long regarded China as an important trade and investment market. It is now South Australia's largest export market, overtaking Japan in recent times.

#### Opportunities for SA companies and businesses include:

- Information Technology, Consulting Services, Infrastructure Services, Education Service, Management Training, Aquaculture, and Horticulture
- Grains, shorn wool (greasy), wood (carbonised not carded or combed), liquefied butanes, crustaceans, liquefied propanes
- Crude materials; mineral fuels; food and live animals; manufactured goods; miscellaneous manufactured articles; machinery and transport equipment; beverage and tobacco; animals and vegetable oils; chemicals and related products.
- Establishment between SA Water Corporation and Shanghai Municipal Water Works Company promoting the SA Water Industry export to Shanghai and surrounding areas
- Medical research, road making technology; rapid building systems

Food for the Future is an initiative by the State Government following on from the Federal Government's Supermarket to Asia program. With a 57% increase in food exports to China in the last year, South Australia is focussed on using our assets to give us a marketing advantage in the food sector.

#### JOBS PATHWAY PROGRAMME STARTS IN THE SALISBURY PLAINS REGION

Trish recently had the honour of launching the Federal Government's Jobs Pathway Programme (JPP) for ten North and North East high schools under the NAREET banner.

"The Jobs Pathway Programme is a Federal Government initiative designed to assist school leavers to make a successful transition from school to the world of work, building on the strengths of school-based vocational programmes, often through partnerships involving schools, industry and the local community. In 1998-99, we expect some 25,000 eligible school leavers across Australia will be helped via Jobs Pathway Program."

"We also aim to give young people a strong message that the best way to secure their future is to invest their time and energy in building up skills and experience, as well as knowledge and awareness, in the pathways that lead to employment, in some cases while still at school."

High Schools involved in the program include Para Hills, Salisbury East, Paralowie, Salisbury, Gawler, Parafield Gardens, Elizabeth Fremont, Smithfield Plains, Craigmore and Para West Adult Re-Entry. For further information, please contact the Student Services Manager at one of these schools.

The INTERFACE Project is run by the Torrens Valley Vocational Education Services Inc. The organis ation is made of many parts – 15 schools and their students and teachers, 58 employers and the Management Committee members who represent schools, businesses and community groups.

The aim of the INTERFACE project is

- To connect existing community structures
- To create strategies to increase employment and educational outcomes for secondary school students
- To enhance the existing partnerships between the program and local industries and community groups.

The INTERFACE Project is funded by the Australian Student Traineeship Foundation and Commonwealth School to Work Funding.

# Budget 99

#### Education

- Increased funding of \$870 million for education over the next four years.
- ▶ \$131.1 million to raise literacy and numeracy standards (record \$869 million over four years).
- ▶ \$77.7 million Quality Teacher Programme over three years.
- ▶ Government schools to receive \$1 billion more over 2001-2004
- ▶ \$153.1 million for university research
- ► Investment in medical research increased by \$614 million over the next six years.

#### **Older Australians**

- ▶ \$209 million additional funding over four years for hearing programmes.
- \$82 million over four years to further boost respite care services for carers of people with dementia and other cognitive and behavioural disorders.
- Mature Age Workers Project to investigate and report on barriers that mature age job seekers encounter in their search for employment.
- \$41.2 million over four years to provide single regional contact points across Australia for community care services.
- ▶ \$110.5 million over four years for new Medicare Benefits Schedule items for enhanced primary care.

## **Tough on Drugs**

- ▶ \$301.5 million over four years to catch drug traffickers and to tackle the problems associated with drug use.
- An additional \$221 million for early intervention and diversion initiatives to fight illicit drugs.

#### Homelessness

- ▶ \$60 million funding for services to support young people at risk of homelessness.
- ▶ \$25 million for the Partnerships Against Domestic Violence initiative.

# Recurrent Expenditure

- ▶ \$30.6 billion on Public Hospitals over 5 years.
- ► \$2.8 billion per year on the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme (PBS)
- ► \$2.9 billion per year for 135,000 residents in Hostels and Nursing Homes

## **Youth Employment**

- ▶ \$111 million to double the number of Work for the Dole places to 50,000.
- \$354 million in 1999-2000 for New Apprenticeships with a total commitment of \$1.5 billion over four years.
- \$60 million will be provided to continue the Job Placement, Education and Training Program.

#### **Disabilities**

- Extending \$20 million of respite support to carers of young people with disabilities.
- Increasing funding for the Continence Aids Scheme.

#### **Family Assistance**

- Maximum level of Child Care assistance increased by \$7.50 per week for one child in care,
   \$11 for two children and \$32 for three or more children in care.
- ▶ \$2.5 billion for family assistance including increased educational assistance, health measures, marriage counselling, relationship support services for men, respite carers of disabled young people, and a support program for women returning to work after caring for children.
