There has been some recent controversy over the release of drug testing kits that allow parents to test if children are using drugs.

I fully support any measure that will help us to remove the scourge of drugs from our homes and schools.

Anne Bressington from Drugbeat, Shay Louise House has recently travelled to Amsterdam and Sweden to compare the different approaches to tolerance of drugs in our society.

Sadly, Anne's findings are similar to those of myself and others who have seen first hand the devastation and impact caused by policies where drugs are tolerated in society as in Amsterdam, Holland.

In contrast, the Swedish 'zero tolerance' policy appears to be winning the Drugs War. Comparing the outcomes in both countries, I believe that the Swedish 'early intervention' model seems to be the best so far.

I will be launching our Tough on Drugs schools competition again in Makin soon, and I am delighted that Anne Bressington from Drugbeat has offered to make a presentation to all schools in the electorate as well as parent information evenings; details to be announced.

I will once again be meeting with all the Principals of secondary schools, church leaders, local police and youth workers in preparation for our Tough on Drugs campaign in Makin.

I believe that we cannot afford to be tolerant of drugs in our society. The war is not lost and as a community we need to continue to be tough on drugs. I am pleased that this policy has been implemented and continued by the Howard Government.

Anzac Day Celebrations

Trish attended the Tea Tree Gully RSL - Pre-Service on Sunday 22nd April 2001 and also attended the Salisbury RSL service on Anzac Day and is delighted to report that these important services were well attended.

Trish is concerned that the significance of Anzac Day, as the national day of commemoration, may be lessened with Kim Beazley's view that Australia Day should be moved to Anzac Day.

Anzac Day is Australia's national day of commemoration, a day that is enshrined in legislation, however its future would be unclear if a Beazley led Labor Party were to win the next election.

Trish is keen to reassure all Australians that a Coalition Government will protect the sanctity of Anzac Day.

Budget acknowledges POWs of Japan.

The Howard Government has recognised the unique hardship endured by Australians held captive by Japan during World War II by making an ex gratia payment of \$25,000 to Australian service personnel and civilians who were held prisoner of war by Japan, in recognition of their suffering during World War II.

The payment will include their surviving spouses, bringing some degree of comfort to those who lost a loved one in the POW camps or supported their partners on their return to Australia. Payment will be made to those POWs, detainees and their widows/widowers who were alive on 1 January 2001.

LEST WE FORGET

Adelaide Darwin Railway

A land bridge to Asia... a nation building project... the Adelaide Darwin Railway is certainly much more than just another train track.

It is the largest piece of public infrastructure since the Snowy Mountains Scheme.

It will complete the vital link between the populated south of the continent and the growing northern regions.

It will create a new corridor, joining all of Australia to the new Port of Darwin - a land bridge to Asia.

When complete, Australia's railway system will span the continent from East to West and South to North. This will complete plans formed a century ago. And it will generate jobs, trade and growth.

Construction will take three years and cost \$1.3billion - funded by private investors and the South Australian, Federal and Northern Territory Governments.

Building has begun with the turning of the first dirt north of Alice Springs. Over the 3-year construction phase of the railway, South Australia is likely to earn \$340-\$640 million in industry contracts, employment and other benefits.



More than a century in the making, this great rail project is finally happening.

Key requirements for this project are:

- 145,000 tonnes of steel rail
- 3,400 tonnes of structural steel
- 7.8 million rail fasteners and clips
- · 2.2 million cubic metres of ballast
- 17 million cubic metres of earthworks
- 1,950,000 concrete sleepers
- 90,000 km of stressing wire
- 60 million litres of fuel
- 7,000 workers to make and supply materials and build the line.

Youth Week Celebrations

In conjunction with the National Youth Week celebrations, Trish launched the 'Youth Resource Card' at Civic Park, Tea Tree Gully.

The Youth Card gives information to young people of services available and their contact phone numbers. The card will be distributed through schools and agencies working with young people from this area.

Other activities for Youth Week included a Skateboarding demonstration and competition, a Youth Issues forum and a Youth Bands Showcase.

It was pleasing to see that the three levels of Government (Local, State and Federal) have been involved



in promoting Youth Issues, together with community participation in the development of this Youth Week.

It was great to see local skate shop "Daily Grind" had provided support as had Jarrad Carr MC and local band YAKSPIT.
