

#### BORNEO: Australia's Proud But Tragic Heritage

Last month at the Torrens Parade Ground, Bruce Ruxton launched Dr Kevin Smith's second edition of his book about the evidence of what occurred in Borneo during those years of captivity. His book includes many illustrations and an excellent narrative depicting the first year in Sandakan POW Camp, reconnaissance operations PYTHON and AGUS and the death marches to Ranau.

Only 218 of 2,030 Australian POWs who were sent to Borneo after the 1942 surrender at Singapore survived to return home. The remaining POWs died from starvation, malnutrition, disease, illness and beatings.

#### The St Agnes Italian Village Nursing Home

The Hon. Bronwyn Bishop, Minister for Aged Care, visited the Italian Village Nursing Home and the Adelaide Senior Citizens Village in St Agnes on the 2nd March 2001. The Minister highly commended the efforts of the Italian Benevolent Foundation as one of the largest providers of aged care services for people of a non-English speaking background in South Australia.

The Minister and Mrs Draper undertook a site visit, observed lifestyle programs and talked with residents and families. Last year Trish was able to present the Italian Village with their Certificate of Accreditation and discussed with management their future plans for new allocations and accreditation.

The dedicated staff and volunteers at both homes deserve well founded recognition for achieving accreditation and demonstrating their commitment to older Australians in their care.

#### Asthma Friendly Schools Program

Asthma is one of Australia's most prevalent diseases, especially among school children where it affects one in four primary children and one in seven secondary school children. Evidence also shows an increasing prevalence and perhaps severity of asthma among our kids.

The Federal Government has provided funding of \$1.2 million over two years to Asthma Australia and State/Territory Asthma Foundations to run **the Asthma Friendly Schools Program**. This program seeks to educate the whole school—students, teachers and parents—about self—management of asthma.

It will also ensure that a school is properly equipped to deal with an attack when and if it does happen, and that the school community understands emergency asthma procedures.
