The Makin Community Christmas Tree




Four year old Meg Gowen donates a Christmas gift for the Makin Community Christmas Tree which Trish has established at her office.

'Tough On Drugs' Working

National security boost leads to record seizures—keeping drugs off our streets.

Since 1997, over 9 tonnes of illicit drugs have been prevented from reaching Australian streets, compared with some 2.5 tonnes in the five years preceding the introduction of the Howard Government's 'Tough on Drugs' Strategy. Since late 2000, Australian law enforcement and health authorities have reported a sustained heroin shortage in capital cities around Australia. Reduced

heroin availability, combined with increased availability of treatment services, has in turn contributed to a reduction in deaths from heroin overdose. Fatal heroin overdoses in the 15–44 age range fell by 58% in 2001, following a 24% drop in 2000.

Record Government funding for hospitals

In 2003–04 the Federal Government is spending over \$31 billion on health. This represents an increase in health spending of around 65 per cent since coming to office in 1996.

Spending on public hospitals will increase to record levels with \$42 billion to be given to State and Territory governments to spend on public hospitals. This is more than \$10 billion of additional funding for our hospitals.

"I support Medicare, bulk billing and the 30% private health insurance rebate and I support the increase in expenditure by the Federal Government on our public hospitals." – Trish Draper MP

Public hospitals in South Australia are receiving an extra \$800 million, with total funding of \$3.5 billion over 5 years.

Protecting the Australian Flag

Recently, Trish Draper (Makin) and Don Randall (Canning) introduced a Private Members Bill in the House of Representatives that would, if passed, provide legal protection to

destroying or otherwise desecrating or dishonouring the Australian flag or an Australian ensign without lawful authority, shall have committed an offence and be subject to a maximum fine of \$11,000.



the Australian national flag, the Australian white ensign, the Australian red ensign and the Royal Australian Air Force ensign.

Under the provisions of the Bill, any person found guilty of burning, mutilating, When introducing the Bill, Mrs Draper said that it was currently a crime in Australia to deface, disfigure, mutilate or destroy Australian coin or paper money, yet no such protection is given to the symbol of our nation.

"You can protest without burning our flag, you can speak your mind without desecrating our national symbol "said Mrs Draper.

Building a Secure Future in the Salisbury-Playford Region

The Salisbury–Playford region is one of only two outer urban regions in Australia to receive assistance under the Howard Government's Sustainable Regions programme. Six regions, throughout Australia, are being provided with funding of up to \$12 million each to develop projects that will boost the local economy, create jobs and protect the local environment.

Trish Draper recently announced the funding of the first five projects in the Salisbury-Playford region—amounting to over \$1 million from the Federal Government.

The projects announced by Trish are:

- The University of South Australia's Peer Tutoring programme which aims to improve tertiary participation by local students;
- Funding for an additional 235 students in the Smith Family Learning for Life Scholarship Programme to help them remain at school or college;
- The Northern Industry, Education and Employment Partnership which aims to train more young people to take up jobs in the region's advanced manufacturing industries;
- Extension of Playford Council's mobile library service to pre–schools and primary schools;
- And a project to help local horticulturalists to reduce the use of pesticides, with benefits to the environment and their bottom line.
